# Fatima and Holy Communion

We are familiar with the story of the Fatima apparitions in 1917 ending in the very public Miracle of the Sun. What can too often go unnoticed is the real beginning of the Fatima story, the apparitions of the Angel of Peace in 1916.



Those apparitions were centered round the Eucharist, called the "Hidden Jesus" by the Fatima children. Their lives and First Communions reflect how important He was for them and teach us how important He should be for us.

## Angel of Portugal

On a spring day in 1916, as on many others, the children took out their parent's sheep. Because of a rainfall they took shelter in a cave where they knelt to say the rosary. They felt a strong wind and looking up saw a light over the valley. The brilliant light took the form of a young man and entered the cave.

His first words to them were "Do not be afraid! I am the Angel of Peace. Pray with me." He taught them the prayer "My God I believe; I adore; I hope, and I love Thee. I beg pardon for those who do not believe, do not adore, do not hope, and do not love Thee." He told them to pray that way often and that Jesus and Mary heard their prayers.

He would visit them two more times in the summer of that year. The first time he told them to pray incessantly and offer everything in their life to God. He told them to especially offer the sufferings the good God would send them.

Those sacrifices would soon come. Francisco and Jacinta's brother would enlist in the army in World War I. Lucia's father began to spend the little money he earned for his family at the bar.

The last time the Angel saw them he gave the Host

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to Lucia and the contents of a chalice to Francisco and Jacinta. It was then that he taught them another prayer:

Most Holy Trinity, Father, Son and Holy Ghost, I adore Thee profoundly, and I offer Thee the most precious Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of our Lord Jesus Christ, present in all the tabernacles of the world, in reparation for the outrages, sacrileges and indifferences by which he is offended. By the infinite merits of his most Sacred Heart and the Immaculate Heart of Mary, I beg of Thee the conversion of poor sinners.<sup>1</sup>

Each of us has a Guardian Angel. We should ask him to help us prepare to receive Our Lord as the Angel of Portugal did for the children. The prayers that he taught them express very well what that preparation is. That preparation is adoration, sacrifice, and trust.



## Sister Lucia

At the time of those apparitions Lucia was the only one of the three to receive her First Communion. She had made it three years previously at age six, unheard of at that time when ten was the usual minimum. It was a visiting Jesuit

missionary, called in to help with confessions, Fr. Cruz, who convinced Lucia's parish priest, Fr. Pena, to include her.

Fr. Cruz had found her in tears at being excluded and examined her. He told her pastor, "She understands what she's doing better than many of the others." Her life justified his judgment. After her First Communion she said she "...only felt at home in some solitary place where, all alone, I could recall the delights of my First Communion."

Before her First Communion she asked what she should do and received some excellent advice from her confessor that bears repeating:

Kneel down there before Our Lady and ask her, with great confidence, to take care of your heart,

### to prepare it to receive her beloved Son worthily tomorrow, and to keep it for Him alone!<sup>2</sup>

Even better than her confessor's advice was her mother's. She told Lucia; *"Above all, ask Him to make you a saint."* Sister Lucia said that one sentence from her mother made such an impression on her that even as a nun years later she could hear the echo of her mother's voice when she received Our Lord.<sup>3</sup>

Sister Lucia lived a long and lonely life. Her death in 2005 was at a convent where she had lived since 1948. Think of how many times she received Our Lord during those years, and how prepared she must have been to receive him!

As a First Communicant, Lucia is already teaching us. She teaches us that to receive Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament means being on the path to becoming a saint.

## Jacinta

Before the Angel of Peace appeared to Jacinta she was identified by her desire for Our Lord. On one Feast of Corpus Christi, she was overjoyed because Lucia's sister told her that they would see Our Lord. Lucia's sister was perplexed when during the actual Eucharistic procession Jacinta didn't strew flowers in front of Our Lord.

'Jacinta, why didn't you strew your flowers before Jesus?'

'Because I didn't see him. Did you see the Child Jesus?'

'Of course not. Don't you know that the Child Jesus in the Host can't be seen? He's hidden! He's the one we receive in Communion!'

'And you, when you go to Communion, do you talk to Him?' 'Yes, I do.'

'Then, why don't you see him?' 'Because he's hidden.'

'I'm going to ask my mother if I can go to Communion, too.' <sup>4</sup>

From that time on, Jacinta was insatiable in her desire to learn



the catechism so that she could receive Our Lord. She never stopped asking Lucia questions about the Blessed Sacrament.

Jacinta would die in a hospital in far-away Lisbon, Portugal. She suffered for two months after an epidemic of bronchopneumonia. She had a large wound in her chest that became infected and necessitated the removal of two ribs. All that suffering for a 10-year-old!

Her great desire in that suffering was the same as before. On February 20th, 1920, she knew her death was near and asked to receive Viaticum. The priest promised to come the following day, but Jacinta did not survive the night. Our Lord would ask her to wait to be with him in heaven.

The great idea Jacinta had was saving souls. She offered everything to God and became a great saint. She even offered not being able to receive Our Lord before her death. Being willing to offer anything for others is a big part of being ready to receive Communion well.

## Francisco

Out of all three children, Francisco was the most reflective and the most devoted to the love of the Eucharist. After drinking from the chalice, he said "I knew God was in me, but did not know how he was."

Unlike Lucia and Jacinta, Francisco could not hear either the Angel or Our Lady speak. His whole focus was on what he saw, which made a deep impression on him. What impressed him most was the idea of spending time with Our Lord to console him.

As part of consoling Our Lord he resolved to avoid all sin as part of doing what pleased God. From age seven he started to go to confession frequently. He became sick with the same bronchopneumonia Jacinta had. Francisco offered everything he suffered to God as a sacrifice.



Francisco had one fear. He was afraid that he was so sick he wouldn't be able to receive Communion before death. On April 2nd, 1919, he confessed and fasted despite being deathly ill to receive Communion for the first and only time on April 3rd. Imagine what Francisco's one

and only Communion must have been! It was the First Communion of someone who only cared about Christ. He teaches us that only caring about Christ means avoiding sin. Avoiding sin is a must for making a good Communion!

## Three First Communicants

The Fatima children's lives are a living catechism. Their story has beautiful lessons for us to prepare our children to receive Communion. If we're honest with ourselves, they have a lot to teach us about receiving Our Lord ourselves!

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## Preparing Children for Holy Communion

Interview with an SSPX priest

## What do you look for in evaluating if a child is ready to make their First Communion?

The easiest way to answer that question is by starting off saying what's not necessary. Children don't need to necessarily have an encyclopedic knowledge of their Faith. Often that can result in them using a lot of words they don't understand.

That being said, a fundamental knowledge of the mysteries of their Faith is absolutely necessary. That does involve some things that they will have to memorize without a complete grasp. The Creed, the Sacraments, the Commandments, knowing basic prayers are all a part of solid instruction in their Faith.

What is most important is that they understand that when they receive Communion, they receive Our Lord. They must know He is truly present in the Host, that He comes to them to help them to be good. If a child can't answer that he receives Our Lord in Communion, he can't receive!

Flowing from that truth, what they do when they receive should be explained to them. Since it is really Our Lord coming to them in the Host, they kneel to receive him on the tongue. They shouldn't look around when they go to Communion.

They should ask their Guardian Angel to help them receive Him well and thank Our Lord afterwards. Kneel up straight when receiving, and before and after receiving, because they are welcoming God with respect and love.

The prayers they are taught to say, the bodily postures they are taught to adopt, all of that teach a child God is there. Our Lord's Real Presence is a reality which is becoming more and more lost, so belief in it must be more and more strengthened from as early an age as possible.

## Who should prepare children to receive their First Communion?

Everyone should know that parents have a duty before God to instruct their children in the Faith. Part of that instruction is ensuring they are prepared to receive him in the Blessed Sacrament. Marriage is for raising children to go to Heaven, which implies knowing they know how to get there!

Of course, that doesn't mean they necessarily need to teach them everything directly. Their parish school or catechism program are there precisely to help parents fulfill their duty. A good practicing Catholic in either environment working with the parents ensures that this is possible.

But even with this help, parents shouldn't "check out" on their children's preparation! As with any part of their education, at home they should check in to make sure that their children are learning their Catechism. Parents should talk to their children about their big day like it's something important. Their big day should be celebrated as well, with a party either hosted or attended! Give them a nice rosary or prayer book as a First Communion gift.

## What follow up can parents do to ensure that graces from their children's First Communion persist?

Simply said, take them to Mass! If daily Mass is not circumstantially possible for some, take advantage of First Fridays, First Saturdays, and feasts. Treat as much as possible going to Mass as a normal part of your life, and not just on Sundays. That makes receiving Our Lord a normal contact in their life.

Children learn by example. Parents receiving devoutly, praying, stays in their head. As with any aspect of parenting, there are all sorts of difficulties and distractions. Crying babies, uncooperative children, thoughts of things to be done that day can make recollection difficult.

However, it doesn't make it impossible. The internal attitude of belief in Our Lord's presence and offering of yourself to Him can be there, distractions or not. If all a mother has is 5 seconds for herself at Mass, use them to offer her Mass in union with Christ's sacrifice to God. Those 5 seconds make that Mass sanctifying for her!
